


Crafting Utopia, the Art of Shaker Women exhibit spotlights the impact Shaker women had on their culture and their participation in a rich, fulfilling lifestyle that provided the comfort of a close community, material security and a spiritual home to thousands of men, women and children.

The exhibit features items on loan from the Hancock Shaker Village, a living-history museum located in 1,200 acres of woodland, field and meadow in the Berkshire Hills of Western Massachusetts. The Village houses the largest collection of Shaker artifacts in any restored Shaker site.


