


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
ART AS DIPLOMACY

or nearly 40 years, the Foundation for Art and Preservation in Embassies (FAPE) has been the public-private partnership dedicated to providing permanent works of American art for U.S. embassies worldwide. FAPE enhances our country's diplomatic efforts by contributing artworks that serve as silent ambassadors, bridging cultures and fostering mutual understanding.

In 2026, the United States will commemorate the 250th anniversary of our founding and FAPE will mark its 40th year of operations. To celebrate these milestones, FAPE, in collaboration with International Arts & Artists, will bring the works from its Original Print and Photography Collections to communities across the United States. The traveling exhibit, which will kick off in 2026 and run through 2030, will celebrate freedom of expression through art.

THE ORIGINAL PRINT COLLECTION


began in 1989 when Frank Stella donated The Symphony in an edition large enough for a print to be sent to every U.S. embassy. It is FAPE's longest-running program, and we welcome a new artist's edition each year. There are now 35 artists in the Collection.

THE PHOTOGRAPHY COLLECTION

was founded in 2013, and each year a work is donated. Today, the Collection includes art by 16 artists.

American artists have shaped global perceptions of the United States since our nation's founding. Early colonists documented our landscapes, while post-World War II movements—Abstract Expressionism, Minimalism, and Pop Art—shifted the global art scene from Europe to the United States. Today, in the digital age, American art continues to challenge stereotypes and provide insight into our communities, reinforcing the idea that what unites us is greater than what divides us.

FAPE's Collection represents artists from different generations, like Ellsworth Kelly, a World War II veteran who studied art in Paris under the G.I. Bill; artists from Gee's Bend, Alabama, whose family descended from enslaved people; and artists born abroad but who have decided to call America home, like Julie Mehretu, originally from Ethiopia. Since FAPE's founding, the collection has been available to Ambassadors and State Department personnel to curate collections of their own. FAPE covers the cost of framing, crating, and shipping.




THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

The Declaration of Independence established the foundations of free expression in America. It affirmed that governments must protect people's rights to "Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness," as the U.S. Constitution later did by guaranteeing freedom of speech, press, assembly, and petition. In 2013, David M. Rubenstein, philanthropist and Co-Founder and Co-CEO of the Carlyle Group, donated a replica of the 1823 William J. Stone Engraving of the Declaration of Independence, which will be included as a cornerstone of the exhibition

for viewers to consider how our freedom of expression has evolved since the Declaration of Independence was signed in 1776.

America Abroad: Art as Diplomacy will prompt visitors to explore how artists have used those rights to share their ideas, inspire others, and build bridges between different communities around the world. Audiences will also have a chance to learn about diplomacy and see American art from an international perspective, as if they were a visitor at one of our embassies.




GEMINI G.E.L.LLC

Gemini G.E.L. LLC has been extremely supportive of FAPE, contributing the publishing of 10 print editions to our Original Print Collection. Founded in 1966, Gemini is an artists' workshop and publisher of limited edition prints and sculptures. At Gemini, the artists do all of the drawing or carving directly onto the printing elements. The edition is hand-printed by Gemini's master printers, and each print is signed and numbered by the artist as well as embossed with the Gemini 'chop.' Gemini has collaborated with more than 60 highly accomplished artists in lithography, etching, screen printing, woodcut, and a variety of sculptural materials.



Universal Limited Art Editions (ULAE) has generously contributed the publishing of the Carmen Herrera and Julian Lethbridge print editions.





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



DIGITAL GUIDE Bloomberg Connects is a free mobile app developed by Bloomberg Philanthropies to enhance the arts and culture experience for visitors to museums, galleries, and other cultural institutions. The app features interactive guides to over 350 museums, galleries, gardens, and cultural spaces. QR codes on wall plaques and other printed materials will allow visitors to access the digital guide for the exhibition and explore behind-the-scenes content.

Bloomberg Connects has also offered to partner with any hosting institution that would like to start their own guide. The onboarding period is approximately 12 weeks, and Bloomberg Connects staff leads a thorough orientation process. They offer marketing support, collateral materials, transcription services, audio recording equipment, printed plaques and materials, among other resources—all at no cost. The Bloomberg Connects staff are also available on an ongoing basis for support and guidance.
